Primary source documents can bring history alive. Instead of reading about a speech in a textbook, one can see the actual speech written in the speaker's own words and handwriting. The Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History's online exhibition brings Abraham Lincoln's presidency to life by making available several of his handwritten speeches, notes, letters, and telegrams. Highlights include fragments from President Lincoln's "House Divided" speech, a letter written on "mourning stationery," used by the Lincolns after the death of their son, Willie, a copy of the Emancipation Proclamation signed by Lincoln, and Frederick Douglass's moving tribute to Lincoln.

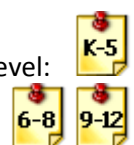

Abraham Lincoln, born in 1809, was the 16th President of the United States. He led the country through the Civil War. He believed that "all men are created equal" and saw slavery as hypocritical. He left a legacy of freedom and preserved the Union. He issued the Emancipation Proclamation and secured

Congressional approval of the 13th Amendment. In his second inaugural address, he offered peace and reconciliation to the South. The Lincoln Memorial was built to honor this slain President. Read a brief history of the Lincoln Memorial.

### [Abraham Lincoln - First Inaugural Address](#)

Grade Level:



When Abraham Lincoln took office as President of the United States in 1861, a number of states had already seceded. Even on his way to the White House, he was carefully guarded. In his inaugural address, he assured southerners that neither their property nor safety was in danger. He declared, at that time, that he would not interfere with slavery or states rights, and would not invade the states with armed forces. He considered the fugitive slave law to be Constitutional. He also interpreted the secession of states as unconstitutional, but hoped for peaceful resolution without bloodshed.

American Memory: Words and Deeds in American History is a collection of online documents from the Manuscript Division at the Library of Congress. "Letter, Mary Todd Lincoln to Abraham Lincoln advising her husband to remove the hesitant Gen. George B. McClellan from command, 2 November [1862]," is from the Abraham Lincoln Papers collection. In addition to the link to the original letter written by the wife of the sixteenth president of the United States, there is a brief introduction with background information on the events and circumstances leading to this correspondence suggesting the fate of the Civil War general.

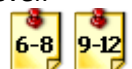
